It was requested that the clerk send a note to Rev. Malcomson in response to his letter.

Safe Church Committee - Laura Austin noted that the General Safety Policy would be presented at the next quarterly meeting and that a parent meeting was to be scheduled to review Nursery and Youth practices and policies.

Ladies Aid Society - Patty Geissler noted that there are plans for a tote bag fundraiser, with the bags featuring the FBCM logo, and an anniversary dinner. An additional fundraiser item of FBCM logo notepaper was also suggested.

Emma Gardiner Missionary Society - Dottie Rose Gilliam noted that meetings are regularly held on the first Tuesday of each month. June's meeting includes a Friendship luncheon with the area ABW invited. The EGMS also could use help with bandages for their planned donations.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS FROM PREVIOUS BUSINESS MEETINGS:

Missions Committee Budget Program Line Review

Laura Austin moved that the Mission Budget Program be changed as follows:

Eliminate the Bacone College line item as we no longer have a strong connection

Eliminate the Young Life line item as the last check was returned and there no longer seems to be a viable organization.

Spring Business Meeting Minutes continued

Eliminate Heifer Project line item as the Sunday School generally donates to this program.

Add a \$500 line item for Samaritan's Purse World Medical Mission, designated for Tenwick Hospital in Kenya, as we actively support one of our church members in this missionary work.

Motion seconded by Dana Yanaway.

After some discussion it was moved, seconded, voted on and passed to change item C to the following:

"If the Sunday School is unable to contribute the full \$300 previously designated on the Mission Budget, the Missions Committee will contribute the difference from their budget."

The revised motion was then moved, seconded, voted on and passed.

NEW BUSINESS:

Motion Relative To Replacing The Christian Education Roof

John Riesen moved that the Trustees be authorized to contract with Architectural Artisan LLC (Guy Myette) to replace the shingles on the Christian Education Building with Timberline 50 year architectural shingles. This includes removal and disposal of old roofing materials and application of new materials, cost not to exceed \$12,000.00. Seconded by Ed Austin.

After some discussion regarding details, the motion was voted on and passed.

Motion relative to the doors between the narthex and sanctuary

John Riesen moved that the Trustees be authorized to contract with Hardwood Fine Interiors, Columbia Glass, and Absonite Glassworks to replace the Narthex Doors with new doors with window design approved by Tom Lackman and the Door Committee, cost of which is not to exceed funds in the Dorothy Lackman memorial fund.

Seconded by Ed Austin.

After some discussion, noting that said memorial fund currently has over \$6,000.00 and the Mansfield Historical Society rules are not relevant as this is an interior item, the motion was voted on and passed.

Motion by Missions Committee to assist with local mission

Laura Austin moved that the FBCM commit to serve dinner once per month at the First Baptist Church of Willimantic who provides dinner four times per month for those in need.

Seconded by Dana Yanaway.

After some discussion of requirements (8 persons, mainly cooking and serving, can donate food) the motion was tabled and it was requested that the Missions Committee set up a trial date and present results to the congregation at the Fall Business meeting or a special business meeting as necessary.

Minutes of this meeting read, motion to approve made by Laura Austin, seconded by Ed Austin, voted, motion passed.

Motion made to Adjourn, motion seconded, voted, motion passed, meeting adjourned.

Once again, many thanks for your thoughtfulness.

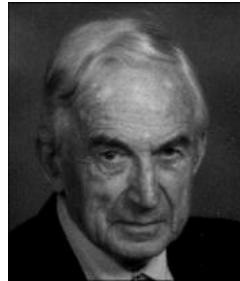

PETERS, Robert Alexander
Robert Alexander Peters, 88, passed away on Thursday (April 9, 2009). A resident of Mansfield for 57 years, he was born on the farm in Sac County, IA, to his parents Julius and Harriett Peters (Willard) on June 10, 1920.

Robert served in the European Theater in World War II in the Third Army and was discharged as the rank of captain. He began his education in a one room school house, and completed it with a Ph.D. in Weed Science from Ohio State University in 1952. Robert served as Professor of Agronomy in the Plant Science Department of the University of Connecticut for 39 years. He married Dorothy Patrick in Raleigh, NC in 1949, who passed away in 2007. He is survived by daughter and son-in-law, Deborah and Thomas Stolar of Salem, NH, daughter Karen M. Peters of Willimantic; and son, Paul W. Peters of Mansfield; three beloved granddaughters, Meghan Stolar of Manhattan, NY, Ada and Kara Peters of Mansfield. His brother, Theodore Peters of Jacksonville, NC passed away in 2006. Robert appreciated and understood the natural world and the mountains of his adopted New England. He enjoyed gardening, skiing, classical music, hiking and worldwide travel. He took two academic sabbaticals, one to The University of California in 1960 and Oxford, England in 1967. He presented research papers in Sao Paulo Brazil in 1965 and Moscow in 1976. He was a member of the first Baptist Church of Mansfield, The Northeast Weed Science Society, and was the major advisor to ten M.S., and three Ph.D. Graduate Students at the University of Connecticut. The family thanks the Staff and Management of the Mansfield Center for Nursing and Rehabilitation for the loving care of Robert. A memorial service will be held on Saturday, April 25, at 1 p.m. at the First Baptist Church of Mansfield, Spring Hill Rd., Mansfield. Friends are invited to the burial at the Hillside Cemetery, Spring Hill Road, Mansfield, at 12 Noon. Harold Everett Mattern's 94th Birthday

On Sunday, May 10th, Harold Everett Mattern was honored after the morning worship service at a Special Coffee Hour to celebrate his birthday. At age 94, he is the most senior member of our congregation.



Born in Chaplin, CT on May 10, 1915, his family moved to Mansfield within a couple of years. His father, August, served as sexton of our church, and his mother, Mabel, attended the first meeting of the Emma Gardiner Missionary Society. Our communion table is dedicated to her memory.

Harold joined our church in 1933. After serving in the Civilian Conservation Corps and the U.S. Army, he married Virginia James of Willimantic and they moved to Voluntown, CT. Their only child, Lee Salina, was born in 1946. During the 1950's the Matterns lived in Willimantic and attended church at the First Baptist Church of Willimantic. During that time he helped to clear land for the new American Baptist Camp Wightman in North Stonington, CT. When Harold's career with the State Park and Forest Commission (now known as the Dept. of Environmental Protection) caused the family to move to Willington in 1961, they joined the Federated Church of Willington. He rejoined our church in the early 1980's.

He has resided with his daughter, Lee, for the past 4 years after living for 40 years on the

Natchaug State Forest in Eastford. He attends Day Care at Woodlake in Tolland, CT on Tuesdays and Fridays, which he very much enjoys. He also makes use of the Companions and Homemakers services and has a "standing appointment" every Wednesday for lunch and errands.

Special thanks to Pastor Ron Baker, Prescott Spencer, Ron Nichols, Ed Austin and his sister-in-law, Hazel Rubins, who often provide rides to doctor's appointments and church or take him out to lunch. This is very helpful to both Harold and Lee!

Harold has 2 granddaughters, Lisa Reas and Wendy Edwards, 1 grandson-in-law, Brian Reas, and 2 great-grandsons, Brendan Everett Reas and Kevin James Reas.

On Wednesday, April 8th, Harold received his 60-year pin from the Masons at a special awards program in North Windham, CT.

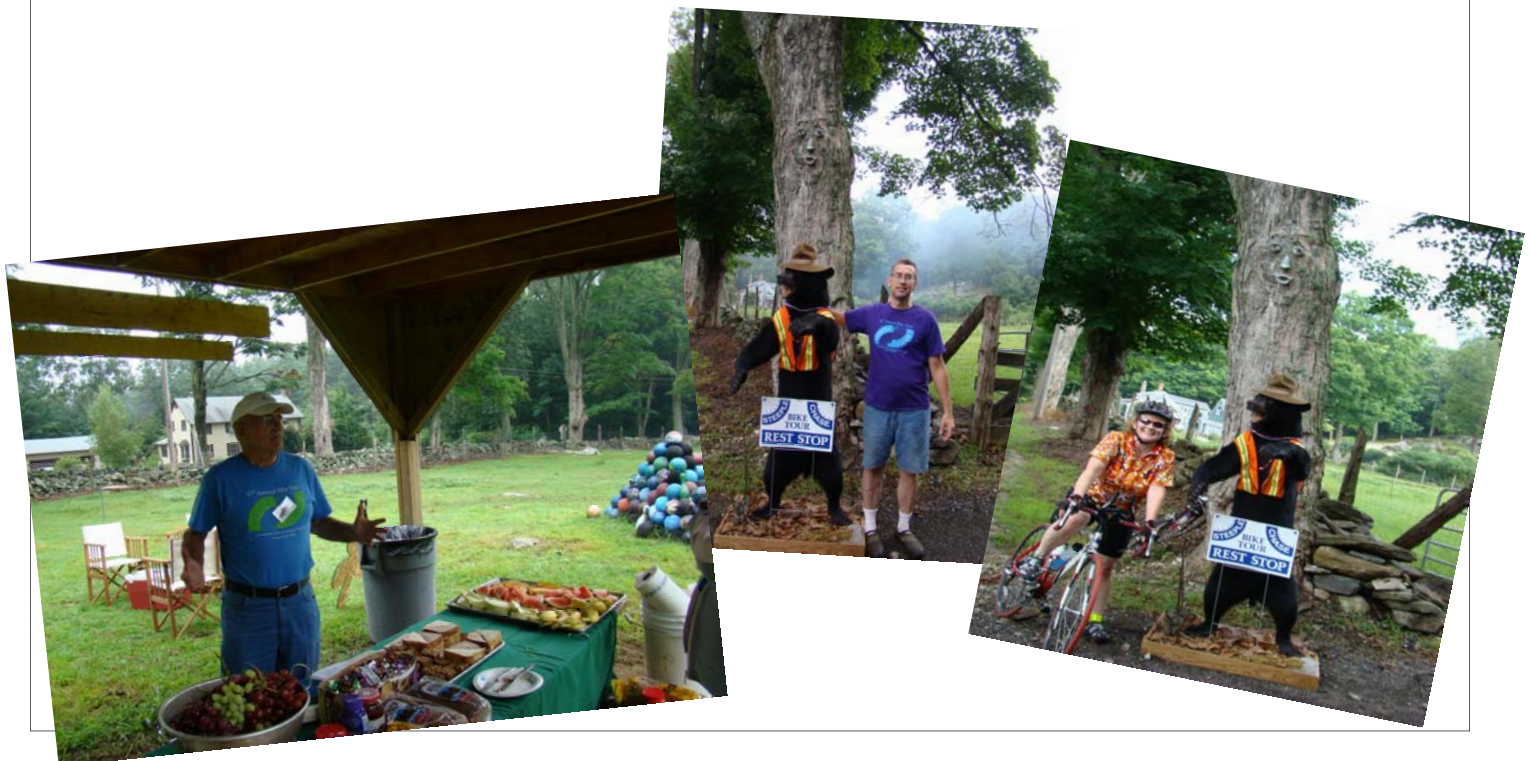


EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL STEEPLE CHASE BIKE TOUR FUND-RAISER Saturday, August 15, 2009

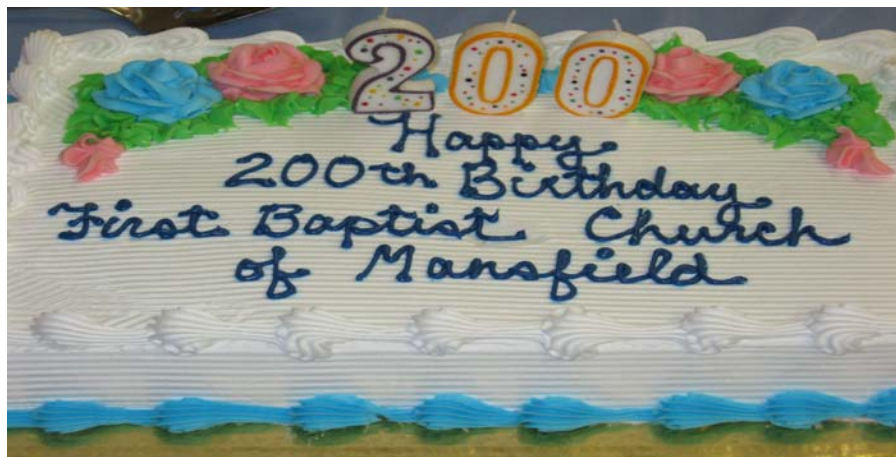

Pastors pictured in the Exhibit are:

(1) Ronald L. Baker, the present pastor, taught for five years in a Native American school in Arizona before his post-graduate seminary training.

(2) Donald "Doc" Buckley, Ph.D., served as interim pastor, shown with his wife Thelma and their dog.

(3) William J. Keane is now Senior Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Branford, Connecticut. While in Mansfield he developed programs in suicide prevention and counseling for suicide survivors.

(4) Alex Elsesser, interim pastor, shown with his wife. He played the musical saw to illustrate his sermons.

(5) Lawrence Whitlock, D.Min., an avid model railroader and ham radio operator, who had worked as a commercial printer before studying for the ministry.

(6) Ted Essebaggers, who served twice as interim pastor, shown with his wife Doris. They were both missionaries in India for many years.

(7) Vernon "Pete" Hood, pastor during the American Bicentennial celebration in 1976.

(8) Franklin Murdock, pastor during the time of social unrest in the late 1960s.

(9) William L. Malcolmson, Ph.D. Fresh from graduate study of theology at Princeton University, he spearheaded the campaign to build the 1965 Christian Education wing, then went on to become a professor of theology in California.

(10) Arthur Dorr, pastor during the Church's 150th Anniversary in 1959.

(11) Albert H. Capista, active in working with Baptist students at the University of Connecticut.

(12) Willard E. Thomen, the last of the pastors shared with the Mansfield Center Congregational Church, who encouraged both churches to become independent again.

(13) Donald H. Rhoades, Ph.D., served both churches while earning a Ph.D. at Yale. He went on to become a Professor of Religion at the University of Southern California and the Claremont School of Theology.

(14) Richard H. Ritter was a teacher in China before serving both the Mansfield Center and Spring Hill churches. From Mansfield he went to the First Congregational Church in Southington, Connecticut.

(15) George Ackerly also served as pastor of both the Mansfield Center and Spring Hill churches.

(16) T. Hawthorne and Florence Jones, both ordained ministers, served both the Mansfield Center and Spring Hill churches.

(17) Roy G. Pavy, D.D., served both churches for one year, then went on to the First Congregational church in Southington, Connecticut.

(18) A letter from Harry H. Powell, written on the occasion of the 150th Anniversary in 1959, recalling church members from his time in Mansfield 40 years earlier.

(19) Leonard Smith, twice pastor of the First Baptist Church of Mansfield and author of a historical narrative of the Church published on the occasion of its 100th Anniversary in 1909. This account was later updated by Church organist and historian Ethel Freeman and re-published with her additions in the Church's 1953 Manual.

(20) Benjamin F. Hedden, whose name is written on the Mansfield Historical Society's "Autograph Quilt," displayed against the east wall of the main room in the exhibit.

(21) Henry Bromley, who left Mansfield to establish Sunday Schools and churches in Brooklyn, New York, and who returned in 1887 on the 50th anniversary of his installation, to deliver a historical sermon in the present (1875) meeting house, recalling conditions in the first meeting house in the 1830s.
