A Word from the Pastor

Well, it's Advent. So what does that mean?

The dictionary definition of advent is "The coming, or arrival, especially of something awaited or momentous." The word comes from the Latin word Advenire. "Ad" means "to", "venire" means "to come". Literally it means "to come to."

In the church calendar it is the time period including the four Sundays before Christmas. It is when we not only wait for the Christ child to come to us again, but it is also a time to prepare ourselves for his arrival on Christmas day. We decorate the church and our homes. We light the Advent candles as part of our worship. We sing the familiar Christmas hymns and songs once again. We read the Christmas passages in Luke and Matthew.

But, what does it mean to you?

I think it means an opportunity to be a little more intentional about caring for our spirits for these few weeks.

It means being aware of God in and around us and in and in the people we meet at church, home, work, and even shopping. I think it means maybe turning off the radio in the car and praying. Or praying for the people we hear about in the news

stories on the radio, TV and newspapers. Maybe after you wake up in the morning you could lie in bed for a minute before you get up, and pray "Make me a blessing to someone today". Or let your car warm up for a minute and give thanks to God for one or two blessings. I think it means being more intentional about reading our Bibles. Go online, or to a bookstore and find a devotional that looks interesting, or challenging, or comforting and use it in the morning with a cup of coffee, or at night instead of watching the news.

As you are shopping either in the store or online, say a prayer for the person you are shopping for. Then pray for them again as you wrap their present(s).

Have you ever written out a prayer? Maybe that is something you would like to try for Advent.

Do you have a favorite Christmas Carol? Try writing a new verse for it. Make it modern, make it personal, then make it into a prayer.

For those of us living in this northern hemisphere of the globe, Advent comes at the time of year when the daylight hours are the shortest. It is a dark time of the year. It is a

reminder that it was for the darkness of our sins that Jesus had to come. It is for the forgiveness of our sins that Jesus comes to us again. It is into this darkness that Jesus brings us the light of the forgiveness and love of God. It is in this love and forgiveness that we are to live. This means not only receiving it for ourselves, but also giving it to others.

The third verse of "O Little Town of Bethlehem" written by Phillip Brooks is as follows;

"How silently, how silently the wondrous gift is given.

So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of His heaven.

No ear may hear his coming, but in this world of sin.

Where meek souls will receive Him still, the dear Christ enters in."

And He will enter in when we invite him. I know it.

Mission Letter—NOVEMBER 2010

Is There Only One Jesus?

When I worked in Cameroon this summer, there were many patients and families who expressed genuine interest in Jesus Christ and many who embraced Him as believers. But, not infrequently, they would return home and continue in their animistic beliefs, even seeking witch doctors for further healthcare. In Africa, there is no division between doctor and pastor as there is in this country. The witch doctor is the pillar of the animistic religion which centers around a worship of family ancestors in order to placate their evil tendencies. Of course, I also heard other stories of those who chose to believe in Christ and rejected the animistic culture at home, sometimes subjecting themselves to horrific beatings and even death.

Now that I have returned home, the same phenomenon seems all too familiar here in the USA. It may seem easy and even natural as an individual to believe (or respect as equally true) multiple different faiths, while choosing to focus on mostly one. For one, it generally allows you to avoid the discomfort of ridicule or other persecution. It also provides the luxury of feeling open-minded, accepting and loving all people—not just those who believe the same thing you do.

The problem is that this approach also does not require one to commit to anything. When you think about it, once you decide that any faith is potentially true, then you have placed yourself, instead of God, in the driver seat as the ultimate judge of what is important or true. One may commit, for example, to the idea of love, which certainly sounds very Christian. But, as soon as we learn that Jesus requires something that sounds objectionable or too difficult for us to accept, then it is all too easy to dismiss. Why? Because we are already of a mindset that all religions are at least potentially true and there are other religions that do not require it.

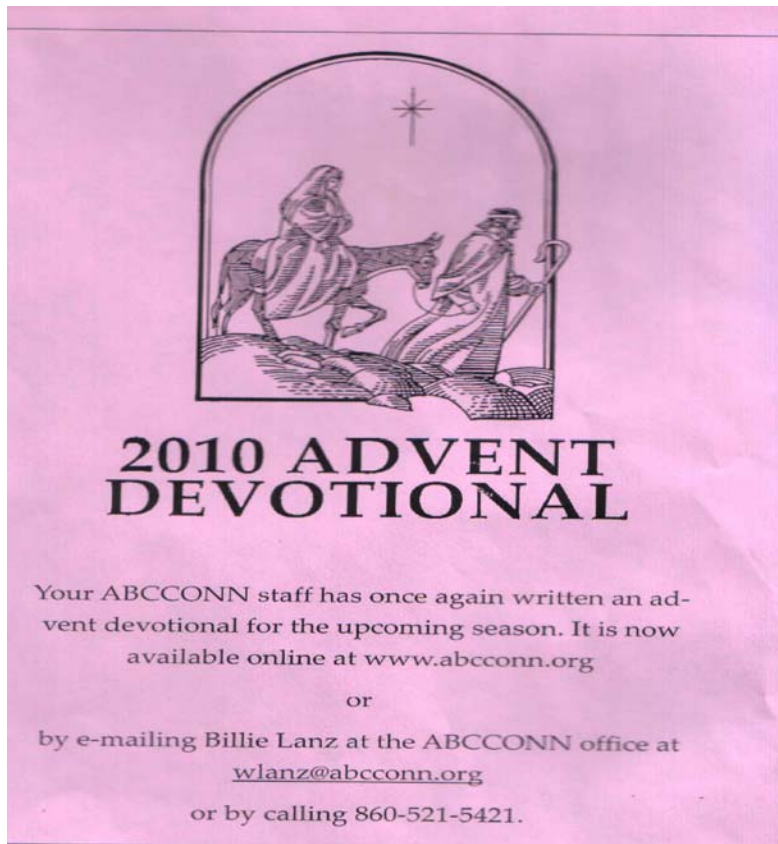
Come to think of it, when we ourselves determine what faith or specific belief is true and what is false, then where is faith at all?

God gives us plenty of reason (requiring our minds) to choose to believe in Him, but does He not expect us to then make a leap and be totally committed?

Or, one may decide that such a requirement by Jesus is only one possible interpretation of scripture, that there may be other ways to look at it. That used to work frequently for me. Who can ever be expert enough to know what is true in scripture? Unfortunately that leads to an inclination to all but ignore God's Word. Why study it if it is all open to interpretation? But when one realizes that our entire faith emanates from revelation, it becomes rather important to determine what exactly is in there. Would God, who looks with special concern to the poor and downtrodden, have given us revelation of such central importance only to tell us that only experts could know what is true? For me, there was only one solution to this quandary and that was to read the bible myself, and re-read it and re-read it. I don't profess now to be an expert (and I often rely on others for understanding of fine theological points), but God certainly gets his central messages across. It seems hard for me to understand anyone who argues with some of these central points being in scripture: God is not distant, He is among us, we screwed up pretty bad and still do, what we think on our own is true and right (such as what love is all about) is usually very different from what God does, God out of His love wants to redeem us, He committed so severely to this redemption that He Himself chose to die on a cross so that He could give all his blessings back to us, the only way back to God is through repentant faith in Jesus as He is revealed in God's Word, and He requires a decision to make only this Jesus the sole priority in our lives.

Roof Fundraising Committee Letter / Pledges



November 2010

Dear Members and Friends of the First Baptist Church of Mansfield,

An article in *The Connecticut Baptist* in January of 1951 reports on a Service of Rededication that was held in our church in October of 1950. The service was held in recognition of three years of effort on the part of members and friends to complete many maintenance, repair and decorating projects in our church. The projects were funded by a memorial gift in memory of Judge Storrs, The Christian Endeavor Society, The Mansfield Community Club, The Ladies Aid Society and the Women's Missionary Society. There was even a scrap drive conducted by Willis Goodale for the benefit of the fund. One of the projects completed during that time was a new wood shingled roof.

That wood shingled roof has served our church very well for sixty years and now it is time to replace it with a new roof. Our church is located in a Historic District and we must replace the existing roof with wooden shingles. The Board of Trustees has contracted with Glenn Pianka of Olde New England Salvage Co. to replace the wooden shingles on the sanctuary roof. The project was started this fall, with the replacement of the back side of the roof in progress. The work on the front side of the church will be completed in the spring.

Initial funding for the project is coming from the Beebe Maintenance fund. The principal of this fund is available to the church for use on maintenance projects with the understanding that the principal must be repaid. With that in mind, the Board of Trustees put together a Roof Fundraising Committee that has been charged with directing the fund raising effort. We anticipate that we will need to raise \$46,000.00 to repay the fund.

The committee, comprised of Nancy Flynn-chair, Patty Geissler-Secretary, Ed Austin and Tricia Baker, had an organizational meeting in October. The group developed a time line for advertising our mission and brainstormed fundraising ideas. Fundraising efforts will start with the church members and friends but we will also be asking for support from The Mansfield Historical Society, The Historic District and the greater Mansfield community. The committee would be happy to hear from anyone who may have fundraising ideas or would like to assist with fundraising efforts. We will keep you updated on our progress.

Two fundraising efforts are already planned. The first step in our fundraising is the insertion of a line item for the Church Roof Fund on your pledge card. Please prayerfully consider how you can individually support this pro-

ject with your pledge. Secondly, we will be hosting a Take Note concert on April 3, 2011 at 3:00 p.m. at our church. The group's newsletter shares the following: "*Take Note!* was founded in February 2003, inspired by Artistic Director Linda Tracy's desire to lead and be part of an a cappella group of select, talented, local singers who enjoy eclectic, challenging music. The mission of the group naturally evolved as members of Take Note! recognized that benefit performances could support local community organizations, while at the same supporting the group's need to make beautiful music. The group became a non-profit organization in July 2004." Mark your calendars for this exciting fundraising event and be ready to invite your friends and neighbors for a sweet sounding concert that will help raise the roof!

As of the beginning of December (one week after pledge Sunday) **19 pledges** have been turned in.

General = \$52,518

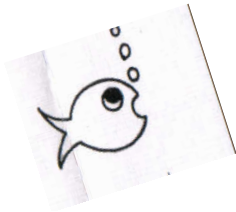
