A Word From the Pastor

Imagine two people sitting together at a Yankee -- Red Sox baseball game at Yankee stadium. One is a Red Sox fan and the other is a Yankee fan. Throughout the game the two are cheering at opposite times, until the stadium announcer says that in the next inning there will be a pizza promotion. If a Yankee hits a homerun in that inning, everyone in the stadium will get a free pizza. The Red Sox fan loves pizza so when a Yankee hits a home run he begins to cheer as loudly as the Yankee fan. There they are standing and cheering for the Yankees side by side. .

Does it matter that the two are cheering for the same home run but for very different reasons?

No, not really.

Imagine someone throwing a big Christmas party and inviting a lot of people. One person attends because she is a close friend of the hostess and enjoys her company. Another person attends because there is nothing else going on that day, and she wants to enjoy some free food. There they are standing side by side at the same punch bowl enjoying the cheese and crackers.

Does it matter that the two are attending the same party but for two very different reasons.

No, not really.

I was shopping at a store the other day when I walked down an aisle that was lined on both sides with Christmas candy. Any kind of candy you could possibly want was all wrapped in red and green.. There were several other people there with me. There we were standing side by side all getting ready to celebrate Christmas.

I wondered about the other folks there with me; why were they thinking about celebrating Christmas? Do they celebrate it because it's a tradition? Is it just a reason to throw a party and have some fun? Do they celebrate it because it helps boost our economy? Do they do it because it's a good reason to help needy people? Or is it in gratitude for God's gift of Jesus?

Does it really matter why we celebrate Christmas?

Yes, it really does.

The first point in Rick Warren's book "The Purpose Driven Life" is appropriate to keep in mind for this Christmas season;

"It's not about us." Christmas is not about us either.

It's about God, and God's gift in Jesus Christ.

It's about being thankful for this gift, and expressing that gratitude.

You know the scripture stories from Luke, Matthew and Isaiah. Keep them close and fresh in your hearts and minds. When you are waiting in shopping lines or traffic along with all these others who are trying to figure out how to celebrate Christmas, say a prayer for them.

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given...and he will be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." Isaiah 9:6

Early registration starts at 1:00 for those attending the service and
the walk will start immediately following it.

We are very fortunate at WAIM to have the support of our community when it comes to helping our neighbors through difficult times. We would like to think things are getting better and that the need for help is decreasing, but in fact, the opposite is true. Higher oil prices, higher electricity costs, and higher unemployment levels will again affect how many children, elderly, individuals and families fare this winter.

If the first three months of this fiscal year are any indication, it's going to be rough. During this period, WAIM has already distributed \$15,951 in energy assistance. For an organization like ours, this is a **huge** amount. Consider that over the same period last fiscal year, we only distributed \$2,600; and \$43,588 through the whole year. At that rate, we're more than one-third through our projected funds, and it's not even cold yet!!

Walk-for-Warmth is the only fundraiser for our Energy Assistance Program. 100% of the Walk for Warmth proceeds plus funds donated directly by individuals and groups are the **ONLY** way that our Energy Fund is replenished each year.

The Walk money enables us to help people of limited means with heating and non –heating utility bills. Families that lose electric, gas or oil service are in danger of losing custody of their children and inability to pay utility bills is a leading cause of homelessness in our area. The fund does not duplicate the government program administered by the ACCESS Agency, rather it helps people whose income is slightly higher than government guidelines or who remain in need after-that program is finished. This fund prevents children, elderly, individuals and families from having to choose between food and hot water...simple as that!

How can you help?

Form a team and ask team members to start gathering pledges on copies of the enclosed registration form.

Walk as an individual, with your family, with your congregation or your colleagues. If they choose not to walk with you, get your friends, family and colleagues to pledge their support.

Make a donation to the WAIM Energy Fund, as an individual or as a group.

All pledge money must be collected in advance to turn in at the Walk.

Ways of Giving to the Church

However, you can just put it in an envelope (plain letter envelope or baggy) with your name on it and we will be able to credit it to you and send a year end statement for tax purposes.

One of the facets of our music program here at First Baptist is the Youth Choir. The Choir meets on Sunday mornings at 9:00 AM for one half hour in the music room of the church and welcomes any young person from first grade and up.

The Youth Choir prepares anthems to sing for Sunday Morning Worship services and participates in other activities as well. Fun inter-generational musicals have been presented at the church for the enjoyment of both church and community, the most recent musical being *It's Cool in the Furnace*, the story of Shadrach, Meshach, Abednego and King Nebuchadnezzar. The Choir, joined by others from our congregation presents a yearly musical program at the Mansfield Center for Nursing and Rehabilitation. 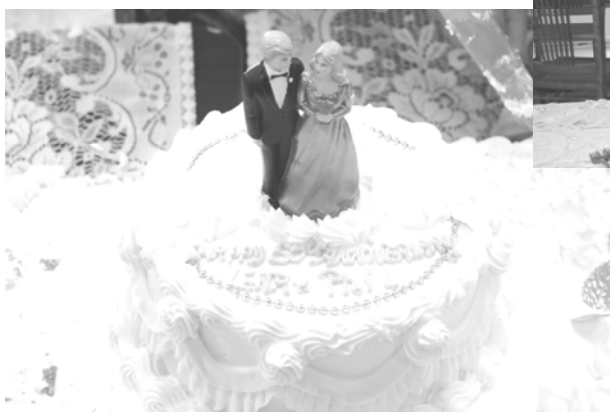
January 28, 2007 is the Annual Business Meeting.

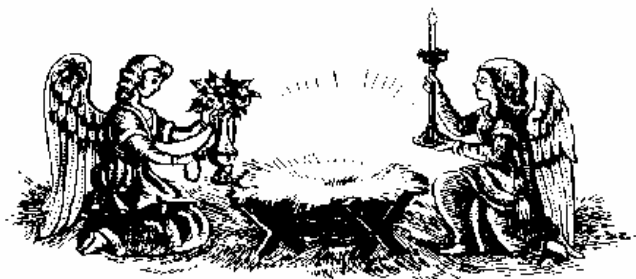
